### **Guest speaker David Meyerend**

David is passionate about seeing the lives of those around him transformed wholistically. His message, "The Call of Suffering" stressed the importance of doing what we can to help others who have spiritual, mental, and physical needs in any way we can.

### New Sunday School program begins this Sunday! "John – The Gospel of Light and Life."

In this six-week, intergenerational Lenten Bible study, participants will explore the Gospel of John and share a journey through this uplifting portion of His Word. We will focus on the identity of Jesus and its significance to all of us, summarized in these verses at the beginning and ending of the book of John:

John 1:4-5 "In Him was life, and that life was the light of all mankind. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it."

John 20:31 "But these are written so that you may believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in His name."

Classes begin at 9:15 in the Hometime Room (adults, moderated by Chip Wilson), the Resource Room (youth, led by Dave Kolator) and the classroom adjacent to the Nursery (younger folks, led by Cindy Wilson) Each age group will read and walk through the Gospel of John using age appropriate materials along the same timeline:

2/26 - The Word Made Flesh (John 1)

3/5 – The Miraculous Signs of Jesus (John 2-5)

3/12 – The "I AM" sayings of Jesus (John 6 – 11)

3/19 – The "Farewell Discourse" (John 12-17)

3/26 – The Arrest, Trial and Crucifixion of the King (John 18-19)

4/2 – Eternal Life (John 20-21)

The sessions are not intended to be a verse by verse commentary on the Gospel of John, but rather to provide for open and reflective conversations on its meaning and significance in each of our lives. Although the sessions will build upon each other, they will be independent discussions, so even if you cannot make them all this study is still for you.

It is our hope that the Lord will bless this program by encouraging discussions among families and generations within our congregation, binding us together through His light and His love as expressed in His Son, our Savior Jesus Christ. We encourage all who can to participate in this journey!
