Here's another opportunity to join a men's fellowship conference: Saturday, June 3, about an hour from Newport up Route 146. The half-day




gathering includes featured speakers and seminars for men of all ages. Cost is only \$39. If you are interested, contact Don Fennessey at fenns@hotmail.com.

Overcoming obstacles— From conception to corner stone

There have always been challenges in our church's history. The original cost target for the proposed First Presbyterian Church building was \$50,000—an underestimate even in 1891 dollars. As the congregation set out to raise the money, the plan was to obtain at least half the money from the gifts and pledges of congregation members. The balance would be borrowed by selling 20-year bonds to gain the broader participation of the Newport community. After all, it was still the *Gilded Age* in Newport.

Early on, the fundraising effort appeared promising, but it soon slowed and fell far short of the goal. Worse still, the whole country was sliding into a deep economic recession that would last for the next five years. And when formal bids came back from the contractors, they were far higher than expected!

At this point, the whole venture might have been delayed or even ended. And except for the Scottish grit and determination of the small congregation, that probably would have happened. Instead, they decided to save money by not hiring a general contractor, but proceeding on a "do-it-yourself" basis. The man behind this daring decision was George Mackie. He had come to America from Aberdeen, Scotland as a young man 10 years earlier. He and his wife were among the first to worship at our start-up Grace Chapel, and he was one of the first Trustees. Providentially, he was also a contracting mason who had worked on some of the Newport mansions. At least two other members of the congregation, Alexander Miller and Alexander Nicol, were fine carpenters, and there were others who felt equal to the task of building a church.

In January 1892 a contract was placed for the foundation work, and the red granite stone for the exterior walls was ordered from a quarry in Braintree, Massachusetts. The stone was brought to the site during the winter; temporary sheds were erected at the rear of the property so stone cutters could work during the inclement weather. By spring, enough stone had been cut to allow actual construction to start.

And so the church was built—stone by stone, largely in the evenings with the volunteer labor of church members. They were mostly young people—artisans and day workers trying to establish businesses and get ahead themselves. Few could contribute money, but they were selflessly devoted to the vision of the new church.

Work had begun in the beginning of 1892, but the formal cornerstone laying did not take place until October 15 when three walls had been erected to a height of about one story, and sub-



flooring had been laid in the sanctuary so a large audience could be seated for the ceremony, which the local newspaper described as taken place "in much the same manner as in the old Roman forum, the roof being the heavens above."

Rev. James Craig presided at the ceremony, and there were hymns, prayers and speakers before the formal laying of the cornerstone. The Reverend Henry N. Jeter, pastor of the black Shiloh Baptist Church of Newport and close friend of Elder Fitts, gave the benediction. It must have been an emotional and glorious moment for those attending.
