Dedicating the new education building



By 1960 there were nearly 500 active members. Two worship services were held each Sunday morning, and the Sunday school classes were overflowing. Clearly, more rooms were needed for Sunday school.

Several options were discussed. When the pastor doubted the church's ability to pay for erecting a new building, one of the military members challenged him about his lack of enthusiasm. The member quoted the words of Malachi 3:10. "I challenge you to put me to the test. Bring the entire ten percent into the storehouse, so there will be food in my house. Then I will open the windows of heaven and flood you with blessing after blessing." Soon after that, the congregation approved the proposal.

It started with a very intense fundraising campaign during which every member was personally contacted. The initial goal was to obtain pledges for \$75,000 over a three-year period. Members were reminded that, "We have been privileged to worship in a church built through the generous sacrifices of our fathers before us. Now it is our turn." And the congregation responded. After all, this was the "can-do" generation that had fought and won World War II.

And when still more money was required Rev. Clark sent out grant requests to every charitable and philanthropic foundation he could think of with no results. He remembered the help the church had received in the past from the very wealthy but now deceased Arthur Curtiss James. He personally visited the offices of the Arthur Curtiss James Foundation in New York City. The trustees were favorably impressed by Rev Clark's presentation and responded with the very generous amount of \$25,000.

The building was substantially complete by the following spring. A service of dedication on May 29, 1960, began with worship in the sanctuary followed by a dramatic procession out through the vestry and into the new building through the



connecting entryway that had been created by moving one of the original stained-glass windows to a new location over the Calvert Street entrance to the Education Building. The total cost of the new facility was \$96,000, and within five years of the completion date it was totally paid for.
