Changing Times and a Pastor Who Made a Difference

During the 1960s and 1970s there were steady changes in the Newport community—changes that inevitably influenced the program and fortunes of the church. The Navy continued to be

the largest employer in the State of Rhode Island, but the types of jobs changed significantly.

As early as 1960, there were slow changes in the demographics at First Presbyterian that reflected these trends. While church attendance was up, it was in many respects a divided church. The military folks and some of the newer people tended to go to the first service on Sundays, while most of the original members still attended the second service. Inevitably there were differences in the priorities of the groups, and for a time, there was even talk of starting a second Presbyterian church in Middletown.

Although nothing came of this, a substantial number of people left the congregation during 1962 and 1963, and it was a very stressful time for the minister. For several years Rev. Clark had suffered periods of poor health. In August 1963, he submitted his resignation. He decided to move on to a smaller parish although, as he records in his memoirs, "...It was a traumatic experience to do so."

And so the year 1964 started in some disarray and without a pastor, but by February the Reverend Tyler L. Johnson, Jr. had agreed to become the 10th minister at First Presbyterian. He was also destined to become its longest-serving pastor.

Tyler, his wife, Janet, and their four young children brought a youthful outlook and enthusiasm to the congregation at exactly the right time. His humble and friendly manner appealed to both young and old in a way that tended to heal any divisions that may have existed.

In the late 1960s a large number of destroyer fleet ships were still based in Newport, but that changed in 1973 when all the ships were relocated to more southern ports. Initially it appeared that this would be a severe economic blow to Newport, but those losses were more than offset by the expansion of other Navy facilities and services. And when the Newport Bridge was completed in 1969, replacing the ferry service, it made the commute to Newport much easier from Jamestown and the West Bay area.

The growth of the Naval Education Training Center (NETC) and the Naval Underwater Systems Center (NUSC) brought in more military people as well as civilian contractors with well-paying jobs. Companies like Raytheon built new plants in Portsmouth or Middletown, and many new homes were built all over Aquidneck Island. And many came to worship at FPC.
